Palmdale School District Mission Statement

The mission of the Palmdale School District is to provide each child with a rigorous and relevant academic education, a safe learning environment and the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for success in the 21st Century.

Chaparral Elementary School is a Transitional Kindergarten through 6th grade school on a traditional school calendar, located in the city of Palmdale, California. Chaparral serves a diverse community and is located in a low socioeconomic area. The student mobility rate is approximately 18% and the actual attendance rate is approximately 97%. The district utilizes a data collection program which interfaces with Infinite Campus, our present data based student information program, to assist with reducing the lag time of information when a student transfers within the district. This will help to ensure a continuous educational program for transient students.

Chaparral Elementary houses eight state preschool classrooms on the campus. Access to a state preschool provides opportunity for articulation between preschool and kindergarten staff, resulting in a stronger, more effective program to start our student's education.

The mission of Chaparral Elementary is to provide each child with a rigorous and relevant academic education, a safe learning environment and the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for success in the 21st Century.

Chaparral School is currently using Common Formative Assessments periodically to assist in driving instruction through the use of data analysis. This data will provide direction to determine the needs for student achievement, which will support with learners who struggle as well as students who need challenging through enrichment. Chaparral is also currently using the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) online system for state testing with the use of a computer adaptive test called Smarter Balance Assessment Consortium. Chaparral students have scored within the district average with regards to the SBAC. We are committed to developing Professional Learning Communities and implementing Common Core State Standards to meet the needs of all students. Student academic achievement is our focus. This focus is centered around the four essential questions. What do we want students to know and be able to do? How will we know when they have achieved it? What will we do when they don't? What will we do when they have?

Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

Teachers meet frequently within and across grade levels in lesson study and grade specific institutes to plan and discuss what they are doing and how to coordinate instruction. A teacher survey is taken at the end of the school year that guides site professional development and in-service selection decisions. Student data is also used to determine professional development offerings. Sites design specific professional development based on academic content standards, the California Standards for the Teaching Profession, and research-based practices.

Educational Services, Special Education, English Learners, Student Assessment and Accountability, and Teacher Support departments participate in the planning and implementation of District staff development activities. Courses are offered throughout the year on week nights and Saturdays.

Trainings are also offered during the summer months on content specific and professional areas such as SIOP, Teacher Leaders, English Language Arts, mathematics workshops, unpacking standards, and intervention programs. . Administration training focuses on the development of learning communities.

Conference and convention attendance, in-service meetings and staff collaboration offers additional opportunities for professional growth. Teachers observe other professionals, engage in peer coaching and work with mentors and grade level or departmental colleagues.
